
WHERE TO GO WITHIN 45-MINUTE **RADIUS OF BINTULU TOWN CENTRE**


Fifty years ago, the town of Bintulu is a small fishing village but a lot has changed since then! Bintulu is considered one of Sarawak's most important industrial hubs, with offshore oil and gas production and reserve. Situated 624km away from Kuching, Bintulu is home to some of the Region's most underrated gems!

Here are some places that you can visit within a 45-minute radius of Bintulu town centre!











See the animals at **Taman Tumbina**

Bintulu's Taman Tumbina is a particularly unique spot, as it has both a botanical garden and a zoo in hilly terrain of about 57 hectares. Opened in 1991, the park is home to animals and plants indigenous to Sarawak and is also the only park in the Region that keeps flamingos, and tigers! Open from 8am to 5pm, Tumbina is strategically located near the town centre, in an area overlooking the South China Sea and is a popular spot for some family time and exercise. Experience the fishing village of Kampung Jepak

Kampung Jepak is a traditional fishing village located near the Bintulu Airport, and is home to mostly Melanaus and Malays. Separated from town centre via the Kemena River, the villagers live on wooden stilt houses and still embrace the traditional lifestyle through fishing, sago processing, fish drying as well as the making of belacan and cincaluk! Only a half hour drive from town centre, you can spend the day wandering around this quaint town or hitch a boat ride out to the river for a little fishing!





Explore the ancient **Tua Pek Kong Temple**

Located opposite the Bintulu Esplanade, the majestic Tua Pek Kong temple has been a part of the town's landscape since the 1890s, surviving a bombing and fire during the Second World War and a second fire in 1975. After major renovations, the temple is now a beautiful, well-maintained landmark, expertly crafted with a waterfall rock garden and a dragon fence. The temple is open to visitors and worshippers daily from 6am to 7pm.


Eat your way around **Bintulu Night Market**
